Make Alternate plans for:

- ✓ being stuck in your vehicle for more than 24 hours in an unexpected ice storm or blizzard.
- ✓ being sheltered-in-place at work for many hours late into the night should a train car leak chemical gas and your cell phone has no service.
- ✓ being apart from your spouse at another worksite, with your children at school and daycare should a tornado strike, and you cannot get to each other, and the phone systems are overwhelmed with calls.
- ✓ being told that a single case of Avian Flu has been confirmed in a toddler in a rural area near your hometown.
- ✓ learning that a potential dirty bomb has exploded near your workplace or home, and all streets and roads in a 5-mile radius are closed.
- ✓ learning that a wildfire is near your family's campsite.
