Mound Plant Former Workers

Population Being Served

The Mound Plant, also known as the Miamisburg Closure Project, was established in 1947 in Miamisburg, Ohio, to produce detonation devices for nuclear weapons. Mound was also involved in nuclear fuels and isotope separation research. Later missions included process development, production engineering, manufacturing and surveillance of detonators, explosive timers, transducers, firing sets, explosive pellets, and specific test equipment. The site is currently in the process of clean up and decontamination. Medical screening will be provided to former workers from this site in two separate groups based on the type of work they performed, production or construction.

Organizations Providing Services

Former Production Workers – This project is led by the United Steel Workers with Queens College of the City University of New York and Creative Pollution Solutions, Inc.

Former Construction Workers – The project is conducted by the Center to Protect Workers' Rights, an applied occupational health research and development center of the Building and Construction Trades Department of the AFL-CIO, in partnership with Duke University Medical Center, University of Cincinnati Medical Center, and Zenith Administrators.

Current Status of the Program

Both the former production and construction worker projects were initiated in 2005 and are ongoing.
